2019 Pennsylvania Health Poll

The following report provides findings from the annual Muhlenberg College Public Health Program survey of Pennsylvanians on public health issues. This year's survey examined topics that included the Affordable Care Act, heroin addiction, e-cigarettes, immunizations, marijuana legalization, and the performance of President Trump's handling of health care matters. The survey marks the 7th year of this initiative that is a partnership between the Muhlenberg College Institute of Public Opinion and the Muhlenberg College Public Health Program

Key Findings

- 1. A majority (51%) of Pennsylvania residents disapprove of the way that President Donald Trump is handling the issue of health care, with only 28% approving of the President's work in this area.
- 2. About 6 out of 10 Commonwealth residents want to either let the Affordable Care Act (ACA) stand (14%) or strengthen it to do more (47%) compared with only about 3 in 10 that either want the ACA repealed (21%) or changed to do less (11%).
- 3. Nearly 2 out of 3 residents (64%) of the Keystone State support the federal government offering a "Medicare type" health insurance plan to all Americans that would compete with private insurance plans.
- 4. Over 7 out of 10 Pennsylvanians (72%) agree that E-cigarettes and vaping are a public health concern.
- 5. For the first time in the history of this poll a majority (51%) of Commonwealth residents favor the complete legalization of marijuana in the state.
- 6. Nearly 2 out of 3 Pennsylvania residents (64%) indicate that they personally know a person who is addicted to heroin or another opiate.
- 7. Pennsylvanians remain evenly divided on the use of taxes on junk food to finance efforts to fight obesity with 49% in support of such a tax and 49% opposed to the option.
- 8. A record 55% of Keystone State adults now strongly disagree that a child's chance of having autism is increased my receiving recommended childhood immunizations.

- 9. Over 3 out of 4 Pennsylvanians (77%) agree that immunization pose little risk to those that receive them.
- 10. A majority (51%) of Commonwealth residents indicate that climate change poses a major risk to the public health of Pennsylvanians.
- 11. Nearly half of Pennsylvanians (48%) identified loneliness as a major public health threat to residents of the Commonwealth.

Methodological Statement

The following report contains the results of a telephone survey of 405 adults in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania between March 18 and April 5, 2019. Respondents were interviewed in English on both landlines (104) and cell phones (301) by the staff of the Muhlenberg College Institute of Public Opinion (MCIPO) in Allentown, Pennsylvania on the Institute's Computer Aided Telephone Interviewing (CATI) system. With a randomly selected sample of 405 respondents the margin of error for the surveys is +/- 6% at a 95% level of confidence. Margins of error for questions with smaller sample size will be larger. In addition to sampling error, one should consider that question wording and other fielding issues could introduce error or bias into survey results. The sample data has been weighted by gender, race, age and educational attainment to reflect those Pennsylvania population characteristics as reported by the United States Census Bureau in 2018. The calculation of sampling error takes into account design effects due to the weighting identified above. In order to reach a representative sample of adult Pennsylvanians both land lines and cell phones are called up to 5 times. The response rate for this survey as calculated using the American Association of Public Opinion Research (AAPOR) RRII formula is approximately 6%. Due to rounding the totals provided in the frequency report may not total 100%. The survey instrument (presented in its entirety below) was designed by Dr. Christopher P. Borick of the MCIPO, in conjunction with students in the Public Health Program at Muhlenberg College. The survey was funded exclusively by the MCIPO.
