Brooke Vick, Muhlenberg's inaugural chief diversity officer and associate provost for equity & inclusion, will be giving a talk centered on navigating impostor phenomena (often referred to as "impostor syndrome," but Vick will discuss the importance of language within these discussions and explain that she is considering the multiplicity of experiences that can comprise impostor phenomena) and mental health concerns in graduate school. Students will have the opportunity to ask Vick, who holds a Ph.D. in psychology, questions about graduate school, mental health, impostor phenomena and more. Students won't want to miss this opportunity to have an in-depth conversation with Muhlenberg's first chief diversity officer!

S. Brooke Vick, Ph.D. is the chief diversity officer and associate provost for equity & inclusion at Muhlenberg College. She comes to diversity, equity, inclusion and anti-racist leadership through her work as a social psychologist specializing in prejudice, discrimination, intergroup relations and the experiences of people with marginalized social identities. Vick's writing in the areas of prejudice and social stigma, as well as inclusion and equity in higher education, has been published in journals of psychology and higher education including *Inside Higher Ed*, *Liberal Education* and *Perspectives in Psychological Science*. She has been recognized for excellence in teaching and scholarship with The Robert Fluno Award for Distinguished Teaching in the Social Sciences and the Paul Garrett Fellow award. Vick regularly works with faculty and staff at institutions across the country on inclusive and anti-racist practices and currently sits on the advisory board for the American Talent Initiative academic equity initiative and serves as the president and co-chair of the Liberal Arts Diversity Officers consortium.
