

The Dana Scholars Program acknowledges students who display academic potential, good character, integrity, and leadership ability through contributions both inside and outside of the classroom. Each summer, Muhlenberg College awards about thirty high school seniors with this honor, one of the most prestigious honors that the College offers.

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### Preface written by Mari Avola

In consideration of our country's racial issues illuminated this past summer, Dr. Hashim reached out to the Dana Program to begin a conversation around these issues. Dani Barrett (2022) and Celeste Samson (2022) were among the first Danas to respond to Dr. Hashim's email. They ultimately took a lead in the initiative and served as the first two Dana interns. Later joined by Peyton Sloan (2023), the Dana interns led subgroups and liaised between the Danas and Dr. Hashim. The subgroups include: SGA Pressure group, Support and Research for Institution-wide Anti-racism group, Workshop Design group, and Coalition Building group. The work of these subgroups and the Dana interns ultimately led to the creation of a Dana Anti-Racism event. The event centered around the education and empowerment of students to better engage and contribute to anti-racism efforts at Muhlenberg and beyond.

### **Dana Anti-Racism Event**

"Anti-Racism in Academia, Becoming a Better Citizen-Scholar" Written by Zoe Bentley

On Thursday, April 1, 2021, the product of months of hard work on the part of a group of two dozen Dana scholars came to fruition to positive reception from the Dana program as a whole. The Dana Anti-Racism event brought together the hard work of Dana interns Danielle Barrett '22, Celeste Samson '22 and Peyton Sloan '23 with the expertise of Ms. Robin Riley-Casey (Director of Multicultural Life), Dr. Emanuela Kucik (Assistant Professor of English and Director of Africana Studies), and Dr. Brooke Vick (Associate Provost for Faculty and Diversity Initiatives). The Dana-exclusive event served as a forum for thoughts on active anti-racism and a foundation upon which those who attended are encouraged to build their own research.

After a welcome and introductions of the three experts and their extensive credentials and achievements at Muhlenberg, they embarked upon an informative vocabulary lesson, establishing key terms and concepts which would be leaned on heavily for the rest of the night. The overview was as engaging as it was educational, demonstrating the value of an informed audience. When considering the frequency with which we throw around terms like racism and identity on our campus, one may think the definitions would be self-evident. However, the conversations to be had afterwards were sure to be challenging, and by establishing certain key definitions from the outset, everyone was able to be on the same page and equipped with the same tools with which we could move forward into informed and effective conversations.

Dr. Kucik began her segment with a history lesson of sorts, outlining the origins of our national conceptions of racial identity. From here she stressed the importance of unlearning our racist educations to be able to move forward and be actively anti-racist, as opposed to just passively non-racist. To go the extra step is necessary in today's social and political climate, and Dr. Kucik engaged the Dana audience to consider things we have been taught that we need to unlearn in order to incorporate effective anti-racism into our everyday citizen scholarship.

Dr. Vick then encouraged us to identify patterns of behavior we may hold onto in the interest of politeness which in actuality contribute to the racist environment we live in. The mission of her segment was to equip us with the tools to "interrupt bias when we see it" without worrying about conventions surrounding politeness. We have to forgo these societal conventions which work to maintain a white supremacist status quo by confronting them head on. She encouraged the Danas to role play scenarios in which we may need to confront racism. By practicing these skills, the Danas are better equipped to interrupt the status quo and be stronger citizen scholars.

Dr. Kucik put it incredibly well when she said, "My understanding of what it means to be a citizen scholar is to be someone who takes your skills and translates them into action with the goal of producing an equitable society." This is the goal of the Dana program, and why this event was such a perfect fit in alignment with our mission. This entire event and all three of its moderators placed a great

focus on what comes after, ensuring that the Dana program is full of informed citizen scholars who will take the conversations this event began and employ these skills in their own lives.

### A Reflection on the Dana Anti-Racism Work:

Like much of America, I would consider the past summer of 2020 to be when I was first mobilized to engage in anti-racist work. The massive amounts of anti-racist information shared following the murder of George Floyd informed me of the definitions and difference between being non-racist and anti-racist. A key distinction is that anti-racists not only do not engage in racist actions, but actively take action to fight against racist structures in society. I consider this the turning point in which I recognized simply being non-racist was not enough. Dani Barrett (2022) and Celeste Samson (2022)\* clearly made that distinction within themselves as they created the Dana Anti-Racism Initiative and reached out to their fellow Dana's to join. I saw this as the perfect opportunity to not only engage in anti-racist work, but to do so alongside my peers in a program that I hoped I would produce tangible change as it would focus around changing my scholars group and college. I knew that I would be working with intelligent, motivated individuals. I knew I would not only enjoy working with my peers but I would also learn from them, so I eagerly joined the initiative. I initially joined as a member of the sub-group, researching college-wide anti-racism initiatives. I reviewed other college's anti-racism action plans, looked into college centers for diversity equity and inclusion, and even met with DEI professionals. I enjoyed the activist work, so Dani and Celeste suggested I join as a Dana intern in the Spring semester, an opportunity which I happily accepted. Our initial goal was to implement college-wide changes like those we researched, but after Dani and Celeste spoke with Dr. Hashim, we felt it would be better to start with the Dana Program itself. We hoped to identify its issues and improve this program before taking on the entire campus. We especially felt that improving the Dana Program was crucial since we call ourselves "citizen scholars." Thus, we must ensure that we are educated to act as anti-racists to produce scholarship that truly benefits the community and makes us deserving of such a title. Over the past few months we have acted to educate our fellow Danas, identifying imperfections of the program, and improving any shortcomings. Education and improvement have always been our goals since the beginning. After we have made our desired changes within the Dana program, we will use the newly developed skills and methods that we have gained from this process as we widen our outreach to encompass the campus to make Muhlenberg a more anti-racist institution. I believe that our work is important because as Dana's we must recognize that we are a privileged scholars group at a privileged institution. By learning the difference between non-racism and anti-racism, we are able to better understand what it means to be a true "citizen scholar." We can then apply that knowledge in our daily lives so that we can help dismantle the racist structures of our society. That knowledge and action can most immediately be applied to our college institution. By hosting these anti-racism events, getting student feedback, and sparking discussion to implement changes to our campus, we aim to keep the light of education and progress we saw this past summer burning. We hope to create a smarter, more aware, and overall better community. I hope that anyone who attends our anti-racism events walks away with a better understanding of the difference between what it means to be non-racist and anti-racist. Furthermore, I hope they are better able to identify where they and our college align on that spectrum as well as the potential steps that can be taken to become anti-racist.

# **Alice Banta**

Alice Banta is a theater and music double major, with official concentrations in performance studies and vocal performance. Additionally, Alice has what she calls an invisible concentration in music history and an invisible minor in women & gender studies. Basically, she says that she refuses to choose one academic focus, but that is in fact the beauty of a liberal arts education. The freedom to explore multiple areas of interest, and the reputation of Muhlenberg's theatre program are two of the main reasons why Alice decided to leave San Diego to join the Muhlenberg community. She also shared with me that she is a soprano and is working towards her senior recital this year. Alice appreciated the chance to design a recital that reflected their scholarly interests as well as their artistic development. Currently, Alice is applying to graduate school programs for musicology and performance studies—both of which tie into her thesis centered around *West Side Story*. This work examines the ways gendered and racial

hierarchies are constructed through Leonard Bernstein's compositional strategies, and puts previous scholarship on the musical in conversation with more recent theories on race, gender, and queerness.

For the Dana program, Alice interned with the Allentown Symphony Orchestra where she was able to learn more about the administrative side of the organization and its general management, while also performing as part of the chorus. For their mentorship, Alice did summer research on West Side Story with Dr. Kassandra Hartford. This work was inspired by a paper they wrote during their sophomore year, and laid the foundation for their thesis. Alice also highly values her senior seminar, where she has gotten the opportunity to work with the organization Scholars at Risk.

Alice has also participated in a number of theatrical productions at Muhlenberg, such as last year's *Too Much Light Makes a Baby Go Blind*. She is also a member of the Chamber Choir on campus, in addition to being a part of Collegium Musicum and the Artist Collective. For her work-study position, Alice works for the Theatre and Dance departments as a box office associate, house manager, and administrative assistant. Alice is also the Hall Director for Brown Hall, which she finds to be a rewarding experience as it pushes her to find creative ways to build community and be a source of support for first year students. Alice also tutors for music theory, music history, and performance studies courses.

When asked what her advice would be for future Danas, Alice recommended focusing on taking classes that interest you, and especially taking classes with professors whose work and pedagogy you find most insightful. They believe that a professor who makes you feel inspired and engaged in the coursework is more important than veering towards the courses you think you "should" take. In terms of her favorite memory, Alice said that she has many but any that really encapsulate a sense of normalcy and life before the pandemic is currently near and dear to her heart, such as late night rehearsals, running from performance to performance on weekends, and the hustle and bustle of Seegers. After indulging me with these silly questions, Zoe graciously began relaying her college career to me.

She's a theatre and music double major, who first visited Muhlenberg thanks to her mother's knowledge of the school's production of *Romeo and Juliet* one year. Zoe reflected on her first encounter with the campus and its students; "It was amazing." Sure enough, she chose Muhlenberg and studied with concentrations in acting and vocal performance... and she loved every second of it. In Fall of 2019, she was able to study abroad at the Theater

Academy of London; she learned *stage combat*. Now *that* is quite the addition to one's resume. She's incredibly proud of it.

She also interned in donor relations at the Barrington Stage Company, a professional theater company in Massachusetts. There, she discovered the business administrative side of how theater gets to work: what goes into it on the fundraising side. It was not all business for her though; once, she worked a shift from 10:30 at night to 6:30 the next morning taking down lights after a production. She reflects on it fondly as a growing experience. This internship greatly helped her figure out what she wants to pursue following graduation. She is currently looking for donor relations positions in the Philly area.

Between learning how to fake sword fight in another country and run a theater, she managed to squeeze in an awe inspiring number of extracurricular activities. She co-founded Magical Memories, Muhlenberg's Character Visitation Club, with her friend. She would dress up as children's characters and go to elementary schools in the Allentown area to read students stories. COVID-19 presented the club with several difficulties, but Zoe adjusted their mission to an online forum. There, they not only make videos for little kids' birthdays during quarantine, they also distribute videos *internationally*. When asked questions about her experience in Magical Memories, she humbly glossed over her contributions to the club by simply saying, "It's so great to see [the kids'] faces." Zoe is also a tour guide, a member of the Women's Ensemble choir, the Muhlenberg Theater Association, and the sorority Phi Mu (where she acted as Provisional Membership Director, running the new member COVID-adapted education process and holding a position on the Executive Board).

What has Zoe gained from the Dana program? Overall consciousness of different topics; one of her favorite classes at Muhlenberg, the George Orwell First Year Seminar; a Sophomore seminar on climate change; her Senior forum project; and an "incredible group of people" that she has had by her side since day one. Her advice to future Danas is: "be open to whatever comes your way. Everyone has something to give to the conversation. Don't be afraid to give what you can give. Everyone else will gain something and be a better person because of what you bring to the table." When asked if she would change anything if she could do it all over again, she told me that she didn't follow through on her own advice enough. She feels she may have "cheated herself out of learning opportunities" because she

thought she should "stay in her lane." Her hope is to inspire future Danas to put aside such self-doubt. With a smile, she added, "I'm really happy with where I am now though, you know? I have the best people around me."

Looking back as a senior, she can say that her initial impressions have proven true. Since the end of her freshman year, Celia has been the President of the Word Weavers club at Muhlenberg College, where she strives to create an environment where writers can feel comfortable and part of a community. Celia emphasizes that anybody in the club can write and share whatever they would like to. Along with games and snacks, the close-knit club enjoys encouraging discussions about writing. Celia also recalls her Dana mentorships as valuable experiences. They enabled her to collaborate with different faculty and staff, leading her to surprising areas on campus, and teaching her responsibility and independence. Celia's first Dana mentorship, with Dr. Erika Iyengar, took place during the spring of her sophomore year. Celia set out to document sustainability practices at Muhlenberg, visiting the roofs of Seegers Union and the LSC and viewing a machinery system in Dining Services that reduces the volume of food waste. Her efforts culminated in an overarching presentation about 'Berg's sustainability measures and a video about Dining Services. During Celia's next mentorship, also under Dr. Iyengar, she focused on creating a module about sustainability for incoming students. She also created a scavenger hunt for Orientation, which may feature as an activity in future Orientations or in classes by Dr. Iyengar. Currently, Celia is working on data from surveys that she conducted during the summer under Dr. Borick, examining how the COVID-19 pandemic has affected people's perception of climate issues and their willingness to change their behaviors and beliefs. For Celia, her Dana mentorships have offered her incredible opportunities to work independently; while this newfound responsibility could be disorienting at times, she affirms that it was exciting and fruitful taking control of these projects. Reflecting on these experiences, her advice to younger students is to not be shy. She encourages future Danas to open up dialogue with professors whose work or research they are interested in. 

Muhlenberg fulfilled his criteria of having strong science and pre-med programs, as well as being close to home. Additionally, the small size offered him a personalized experience where people genuinely cared about the work they were doing, making Muhlenberg a perfect fit for Jon.

Through the Dana scholarship program, he has had the opportunity to conduct research in the lab

of Dr. Jeremy Teissere, investigating the effects of phytocompounds on the GABA(A) receptor. He says that his courses with Dr. Teissere, combined with his research experience, changed his life: "Applying the work that you do in class to something bigger is so important." After graduation, he plans to carry what he's learned at Muhlenberg to a gap year research experience before going on to pursue his medical degree in psychiatry.

Jon can normally be found studying neuroscience by day and saving lives by night. As an EMT at Muhlenberg, Jon responds to medical emergencies on campus. A typical shift starts with "truck check" at 5pm to verify that all equipment is functioning properly, followed by 24 hours on call. During this period, he sleeps with his uniform on and his pager by his side, ready to spring to action at a moment's notice to provide medical intervention on behalf of Muhlenberg students in crisis. Through End Overdose Together, he is trained to administer the life-saving drug Narcan, designed to limit the likelihood of an opioid overdose.

During quarantine he became interested in biking, and his ultimate goal is to complete a 300 mile bike trip from Pittsburgh to Washington, DC. Another of his hobbies is photography, which he uses in service of the Muhlenberg community. One of his favorite memories of his time here is taking pictures for Top Naach's annual observance of Holi, the Hindu festival of colors.

One of the most significant Muhlenberg experiences that left an impact on Jon was the time he spent as an RA. Not only did he forge strong bonds with younger students, but the network that he gained through his relationships with the other RA's solidified his sense of belonging within the Muhlenberg community.

Through his contributions as an RA, EMT, research assistant, Dana scholar, and photographer, Jon has offered so much to Muhlenberg, and we are sad to see him go. His parting remarks serve as wise guidance to future Danas and Muhlenberg scholars alike: "It's important to craft your own story. Work on shaping yourself into someone unique rather than just fitting the mold of what you think others want to see... make sure you're doing things that are important to you, because you only get so long at Muhlenberg."

Other reasons for setting his eye on Muhlenberg have to do with his very personable character; as a small, welcoming college, Muhlenberg is a great college with great opportunities for a people-person to get familiar with both professors and peers. He does attest to the community behind the college, to all the

people he's been able to live and work with. Jacob has truly enjoyed his time at Muhlenberg, especially in collaborating with professors and students to work on his passions: mathematics and chemistry.

An anomaly to students, most of whom change their major within their undergraduate years, Jacob has known since early high school what he wanted to do with his major. It was a clear-cut decision that he would go into Chemistry after enjoying that class so much in high school, and after taking Calculus in his senior year it was impossible for him to settle for one major or the other, not with his fascination with this mathematical logic. Most of his college career has been in pursuit of making these two passions meet, to combine them into something both enjoyable and practical.

The product of this work? A honed-in focus on theoretical and physical chemistry, subjects that quickly turn away those hesitant to engage in such complex work. This didn't deter Jacob, however; in fact, his research this year has been delving into a specific set of equations, those calculating the wave function of a quantum mechanical harmonic oscillator. Known to have a particularly complex set of calculations behind it, students are often told the answer rather than how to solve it. His work culminates in a paper with Dr. Michael Huber and Dr. Justin Sparks, focusing on uncomplicating this problem so that it can easily be explained in front of undergraduates instead of passing off the work; he wanted to make sure that students could fully understand the facets of the equations they work with. He aims to take this positive perspective into his career as well; he maintains the belief that the complicated parts of mathematics can easily be solved in the teaching, rather than the methods, of solving. He will pursue a Ph.D. in theoretical chemistry degree at Princeton University, which could help him accomplish this goal as a professor himself.

Having nearly finished his career at Muhlenberg, he has two pieces of advice: on a lighter note, don't underestimate the gym. It's not just for developing your body, not when you can build a community of people to go through the work with you. The second, and more serious advice, is that you don't have to be the best in order to make something out of your life. Understand that you have potential, and under all circumstances should strive to reach it; but don't let the effort of making grades kill you, and don't let academics become the only thing left in your life.
